#### **MILESTONES**

#### CONSIDERING TIM

If I had been in the College Choir while I was a student at God's Bible School, I would be in a better position to talk about "Mr. Crater, my choir director." I am sure other tributes will give a "student's perspective" on Tim's musical and spiritual influences. He arrived on staff at GBS about the time I married and moved off campus, so I did not have a chance to interact with him much while I was a student. By the time he had assumed the responsibilities of choir director, I was pastoring a church. I did get to see him lead the choir as a member of the congregation many times. It was evident that he was an accomplished director.

Now, from my position as president, I can give a few more specifics. Tim is passionate about creating an atmosphere of worship—both for the choir and for those for whom they sing. I never worry if the music he selects will minister to our constituents. I have never been embarrassed by the selection of songs or the musicality of the choir. When he leads the congregational singing for our chapel services, you can always count on his careful, prayerful selection of music.

Tim's family have been faithful companions to his ministry here. They dearly love this dedicated husband and father. (See "Crater Family Tributes," p.22.) Yes, it is easy to look up to Tim—such a hard worker...and a classy dresser! But ultimately, Timothy Crater is a man after God's own heart. Enjoy this glimpse of his life to this point. We hope that GBS will be blessed by many more years of his dedicated service.

#### **GBS HERITAGE**

The story of Dwight Timothy Crater begins with Dorothy Lawson, born and reared in Rockingham County, North Carolina. Her parents were itinerant tobacco farmers of the Baptist faith. Dorothy was the last of 11 children, and she had many wonderful childhood memories, even amidst hardships—she grew up in poverty, and her father died when she was only 10 years old. A hard worker, she was known as the fastest tobacco stringer in Rockingham County!

When Dorothy was 16, she gave her heart and life to Jesus while kneeling by her bedside, and she became a tremendous witness for Him. Later, while she

was living with her sister and brother-in-law in Eden, North Carolina, they attended a small Wesleyan church near Martinsville, Virginia. A preacher by the name of Bud Easter

suggested she should attend God's Bible School. She enrolled in September 1952 and completed the Christian Workers Course in 1954, after which she served as Dean of Women from 1954 to 1962.

Meanwhile, Dwight D. Crater was also on

his own trajectory to GBS. He was born in Thomasville, North Carolina, and reared in nearby High Point. His father was a holiness preacher who pastored several small churches, eventually founding Trinity Holiness Church in the 1950s in Sophia, North Carolina. Dwight had been saved in High Point at a Youth for Christ meeting when he was 14. During the Korean conflict, he served in the U.S. Army and was deployed for a time in Korea. After his discharge, he worked with his


brothers in a couple of different entrepreneurial endeavors.

He made his way to GBS in September 1958 and received a Christian Workers Course diploma in 1959 and a ThB in 1961. He then served GBS in several different capacities, some concurrently: faculty from 1961 to 1966, teaching Bible, theology, and homiletics; Assistant Dean of Men from 1961 to 1964; Dean of Men from 1964 to 1965; and Christian Service Director from 1965 to 1966.

Dwight was very aware of Dorothy, who was Dean of Women. Soon after they began dating,

> This time her answer was "yes." On November 24, 1962, at the Dan River Wesleyan Church near Eden, they were married. Rev. E.G. Marsh, president of GBS, officiated the ceremony.

While Dwight continued various jobs at GBS, Dorothy did

was born on June 18, 1964. Little Tim's first home was on the GBS campus. Later, Tim was dedicated to God by President Marsh during a GBS camp meeting ceremony. Tim has very few early memories of GBS, but he does remember living in "the middle house with the bay windows" on the west side of the 1800 block of Young Street, and some vague memories of the campus when he returned for a visit in 1968.

#### NORTH CAROLINA ROOTS

In 1966, when Tim was two, his parents left Cincinnati to return to North Carolina. They moved into a mobile home on the church property in Sophia—the church that Tim's Grandpa Crater had founded. Tim's dad found a job in High Point at the Picket Cotton Mill working as a foreman in the shipping department. This central North Carolina town was highly industrialized and was known for producing textiles and furniture. Tim recounts some memories from that time:


"The church property was a narrow strip of land bordered on one side by a very busy highway and on the other by a railroad track. Our mobile home sat beside a grove of trees, just yards from my grandparents' house. I spent a lot of time riding a tricycle through the trees and playing on a swing set facing the railroad. Periodically a freight train would pass. I remember watching the train from the top of the sliding board. Some days the kind conductor would throw candy for me and wave.

"I remember a Sunday night service as a child when the Holy Spirit deeply convicted my heart. I remember listening to the recordings of the Bill Gaither Trio at my grandma's house and relishing the sweet harmonies. Many wonderful memories were made at my grandparents' table eating Grandma's delicious fried chicken and mouth-watering biscuits. I would stand by her while she rolled out the dough. I loved to eat the uncooked dough and she would graciously share it with me. Grandpa would tell me that I was going to get cancer."

While in North Carolina, Tim had many opportunities to bond with uncles, aunts, and cousins on his dad's side, as well as some of his mom's family who lived in Eden. It was a blessing for Tim, who was an only child, to be around his relatives, especially those close to his own age.

In 1969, a Christian day school was started at the Free Pilgrim Church in nearby Thomasville. Tim's parents were asked to be two of the four original teachers. Dorothy taught grades 1-3 and Dwight taught Bible, history, and math in the high school. They believed that this was the specific reason God had moved the family back to North Carolina. The Craters bought a larger mobile home and moved to the new campus of Carolina Christian Academy.

"As a child, I realized this was a major move, but I didn't know the impact it would have on my life. Some family members were concerned that my dad was leaving a well-paying job to work fulltime in Christian ministry.





It has been my privilege to be longtime friends of Tim and Tanya Crater after having been classmates with them in college at GBS. I've also enjoyed a very special relationship with their kids who have called me "Uncle Kevin" since they were first able to speak. Congratulations, Tim, on this milestone!

This certainly greatly affected their financial status, but in retrospect I'm thankful they responded to God's call.

"I spent many days on my bike riding around the campus and playing with the campus kids. I have many happy memories. While I slept one night, a dangerous storm was in our area. My parents were praying as it moved through the campus. It uprooted large oak trees just across the road from our mobile home—literally a stone's throw away from our trailer. The next day the campus children played on the trunks of the downed trees. I'm sure my parents gave God the glory for saving our lives and the campus homes.

"My parents were humble, earnest Christ-followers. They believed deeply in the power of prayer. When Mama prayed, things happened. She was also a strong disciplinarian—driven, dynamic, and resourceful. But, she knew how to make hard work fun! She carried this enthusiasm into the classroom and other ministries. Somehow, she had a talent for inspiring others to greatness.

"My father was a man of sterling character, a quiet southern gentleman who was most happy when reading one of the holiness classics in the evenings. His quiet personality didn't keep him from witnessing and telling people about Jesus. He even started a prison ministry in a local prison. He had taught a class on personal evangelism at GBS, so he was simply living out what he had preached! When I got older and learned how to play the accordion, I would accompany him on many Thursday evenings and play along as he led the prison inmates in singing."

Tim was "always the scrawny kid in the class and seemed to be a late bloomer at every stage of life"—something he blamed on being born six weeks premature. He completed all 12 years of grade school at Carolina Christian Academy and was a good student. Grades meant everything to him, and he loved his teachers, many of whom were GBS





usually at the top of his class, but in his senior year of high school, another student pulled slightly ahead, leaving him to graduate as salutatorian in 1982. Tim admits that peer pressure finally caught up with him the last couple of years of high school. "I delighted in being more popular and was proud to be the class president in both my junior and senior years, but those things failed to make me into a better person."

As a kid, Tim had always wanted to be "some kind of musician." He has early memories of riding in the front seat of the family car and enthusiastically singing "Dwelling in Beulah Land" while pretending to play the piano on the dashboard. He started taking piano lessons when he was in the third grade. Mrs. Ellen Hemrick was an excellent teacher/musician who directed the high school choir. His parents bought a used piano for \$300 from a music store in the Westchester Mall in High Point. Looking back, Tim says, "Its brilliant tone sounded like it came straight from a honky-tonk, but this instrument became my dear friend and opened limitless musical doors for me."

Tim learned to sing alto under Mrs. Hemrick's tutelage in the junior choir in about the third or fourth grade. Once he learned to sing a harmony part, he was "hooked for life!" He continued singing in the high school choir, which was also directed by Mrs. Hemrick. "I'll always remember the beautiful arrangement of 'God Knows All About Tomorrow' that we sang at my high school graduation," Tim says.

Tim also sang tenor in a mixed quartet at his church. There was a trio of some renown called The Young Witnesses led by the group's pianist/singer, Paul Beck. When one of its members left for college at GBS, Tim took his place. Tim relishes memories of singing with that group.

"Paul was a musical genius, and at the time I didn't realize the impact he would have on me. Singing with this trio gave me opportunities to sing in churches in the local area and in revivals and camp meetings in Alabama, Ohio, and Illinois. I loved singing, but I wasn't serving the Lord, though I professed to be a Christian. I'm sure that my singing partners wondered about my shallow commitment, but they gave me the benefit of the doubt. We certainly had a barrel of fun. Paul Beck and Randall Crotts were earnest followers of Christ and had a lasting impact on me. One of the most powerful memories I have was singing 'Whatever It Takes' at the Alabama Bible Methodist Youth Camp one night when the presence of Jesus swept over the congregation and the altar lined. I stand amazed at the lovingkindness and tender mercies of my heavenly Father. I can't understand why God chose to use this marred vessel, but I'm sure He was honoring the prayers of my trio members and those of the people working on the Pell City campground."

tle-to-no desire to adopt their careful lifestyle, which I was sure would leave me with little of this world's goods."

In his early years his heart had been tender. He had bowed at altars many times but had never made a full commitment to serve the Lord. After graduating from high school at Carolina Christian Academy in 1982, Tim stayed in Thomasville and continued his education at the newly formed Bible college on the same campus. He realizes now that it was the goodness of God that kept him at home for one more year. During the Spring of 1983, he began to come to grips with his sinfulness and lack of purpose. Every year now, he tells those in the GBS College Choir about going to a GBS choir service at the Christ Wesleyan Church in Greensboro during that spring, and the impact that the anointed singing had on his heart.

"I was accustomed to seeing 'old people' loving and serving Jesus, but I was not used to seeing 'young people' sing under the anointing. I didn't give my heart to the Lord that night, but I truly believe God used that choir service to bring me to a place of repentance. Somehow God showed me who I really was, and I got very scared. During the 10day camp meeting held just across the road from my home, I started getting honest with God and myself, and the Holy Spirit began to put me under deep conviction of sin. I had lied about so many situations to cover my tracks and the Devil told me I could never find Jesus! But on the last Sunday night of the meeting, I determined to get right with God. As Rev. V.O. Agan preached that final service, I was under deep conviction. Providentially, I was sitting near the front because I couldn't get to the altar fast enough. I prayed in desperation, and, of course, Jesus came and forgave me and made me a new creature in Christ Jesus! It was a watershed moment, and I have never forgotten when 'My chains fell off and my heart was free!' My spiritual birthday is June 19, 1983. God gave me the courage to stand up on the next Wednesday night in my home church, confess my hypocrisy, and tell how Jesus saved me."

#### **COLLEGE TRANSFER**

Tim had recently attended the 1983 VIP Day for prospective students at GBS. Now he had a decision to make: continue at CCA or transfer to GBS. He was attracted to GBS because of his parents' history there and the College Choir under the direction of Garen Wolf. He also wanted to take piano lessons from Professor Archie Coons. Several CCA staff with connections to GBS also had an influence on him. "David Stetler [GBS alumnus] had a tremendous influence on my life. Dorothy Bowen [former GBS faculty and College Choir accompanist] gave me voice and piano lessons, and I looked up to her as well."

He decided to transfer to GBS and arrived there in August 1983. He doesn't recall ever considering another degree other than music education. That degree required a primary and secondary instrument. His primary emphasis

was piano, and his secondary was voice. This required him to take four years of piano and two years of voice. The fact that he "squeezed my GBS days into six years" was probably a testament to his extracurricular involvement. For five years, he was in the College Choir and other small, public relations groups. In fact, for each of those years he sang with a different combination of voices in three male quartets and two male trios. He also traveled for the school during those summers.

"My first summer, I traveled with Professor Kenneth Stetler. I found this man to be a spiritually-minded PR representative, but always ready to take us to memorable points of interest. One highlight was visiting the World Trade Center in New York City and standing on the observation deck 1,377 feet above street level.

"My second summer of PR travels was a Western tour with Larry Jewett as school representative. Phil Collingsworth, Ralph Tuttle, John Case, and I sang with Pat Jewett accompanying. We made it all the way to California and the West Coast in a motor home. The Jewetts were so much fun, and I loved traveling in the West. For my last two years of travel, I sang and played the piano with a quartet and a trio. I even traveled a few times with Dr. Ken Farmer, current editor of *God's Revivalist*, as the PR representative. The Lord allowed me to travel with quartet and trio members who were earnest in their desire to worship and glorify the Lord in our services. I loved it! One of those individuals, Ralph Tuttle, was also my roommate. He became the brother I never had. To this day, I am honored that his parents consider me to be their 'adopted son.'"

#### TANYA'S ENTRANCE



A few months into the relationship, Tanya "knew that Tim was the one," adding that "it took Tim a few years" to come to that same realization. Tim eventually came to the conclusion that he could spend his life with "this sweet

girl." They walked down the aisle together as music education graduates from GBS in 1989. The "other aisle" would come later.

Tanya moved back home to Indianapolis and worked for a local dry cleaner during the day doing alterations. In the evenings she did private tutoring for Sylvan Learning Centers. Tim accepted a full-time position teaching music at Liberty Bible Academy, a new Christian school in the Cincinnati area, founded by GBS alumnus Dean Truesdale, which originally was located at the Kenwood Bible Methodist Church. Tim's first classroom for grades K-8 was on the platform of the old church sanctuary. Tim's studies at GBS and his student teaching at Cincinnati Christian Schools proved to be excellent training. However, one thing was lacking. Tim had never taught an official piano lesson until he started teaching private piano lessons at LBA.

"I remember getting out my notes from Professor Bill Lipke's piano pedagogy class on how to teach your first piano lesson. It worked—the student survived!"

During this time, Tim house-sat in Loveland, Ohio, for some friends while they spent the school year with their daughter on the mission field. Although they acted like Tim was doing them a favor, he says, "In actuality, they gave me a tremendous gift!"

As Tim and Tanya continued dating, they spent a lot of time together on the weekends, and Tanya's artistic talents helped Tim to have outstanding classroom bulletin boards, which were changed monthly.

"We kept Interstate 74 hot during that last year of courtship. I asked Tanya to marry me on Sweetest Day, October 21, 1989. Of course, at that point I had no idea how much she would balance out this guy! She has kept my feet on the ground when my emotions have soared and brought sanity when I thought I would lose my mind." They were married on June 8, 1990, at the Southport Church of the Nazarene in Indianapolis. Both of their pastors officiated the ceremony: Rev. Arthur



Swaney, Tim's pastor from North Carolina; and Rev. Gene Bennett, Tanya's pastor at Southport Nazarene.

While Tim had been living in Cincinnati, he attended church at Loveland Wesleyan Chapel, pastored by GBS alumnus Ray Campbell, and that became the Craters' church home after they were married. Tim played the piano regularly, and he and Tanya sang a lot of specials.

In the fall, Tanya began teaching grades three and four at Liberty Bible Academy. She continued for two years until they began expanding their family as Katrin was born September 11, 1992. Around that time, Dean and Ona Truesdale were leaving their job as caretakers of a lovely condominium building near Mt. Lookout, and they recommended the Craters for the position. As caretakers, the Craters lived in a basement apartment rent-free for five years with an extra salary. Their son Zachary was born May 19, 1995.

Tim has many fond memories of working with the teachers and students under Dean Truesdale's leadership at LBA. "Dean ran a really tight ship, and I learned so much under his leadership. I worked hard, and I fell in love with the students. There were times that I would direct two musicals in one night, one for grades K-4 and one for grades 5-8. I also fell in love with leading the musical part of the chapel services each Friday. I found that children were easily drawn in by a good dose of

enthusiasm." However, when his pastor, Ray Campbell asked Tim to be in charge of leading the singing for their church services, he was hesitant at first. "But Pastor Campbell wisely told me that he thought I was capable and that he needed me. God used this opportunity to open a new door of ministry."

#### **NEW ADVENTURES**

In the winter of 1999, on a Sunday morning, Tim was praying in a Sunday school room at church. He sensed that God might be asking him to make a change, and he struggled with that. As the school year came to a close, he said, "It became clear to me that God was going to move me away from the institution and group of people I dearly loved. When I think back to that time twenty-five years ago, I still remember the promise God gave me: 'My presence will go with you, and I will give you rest.'"

Somehow GBS Music Chair Garen Wolf heard that Tim might be leaving LBA. He told the GBS academy principal, David Crosley, to contact Tim to see if he was interested in teaching music at the academy. He was.

"When I returned to GBS, I worked primarily for Aldersgate Christian Academy (ACA). I was also the piano accompanist for many, if not all, of Mr. Wolf's voice lessons. I spent hours with this great man. Observing his teaching gave me so much more practical experience than I had been able to receive as a student. I also accompanied many junior and senior vocal recitals."

On March, 29, 2000, toward the end of Tim's first year at ACA, Caroline was born. The family was now complete.

Tim initially taught elementary music classes, accompanied the High School Choir, directed several ACA Christmas musicals, and even worked part-time in the learning center. Most of his time was spent in his windowless classroom on the mezzanine floor of the Miller-Deets Student Center teaching general music.

"I was cloistered away in that room on September 11, 2001. Some of the older elementary students told me that a plane had hit a building in New York City and that there was a fire in Washington, D.C. In my ignorance, I told them that there couldn't be any relationship between the two incidents as those two cities were miles apart. When I finally finished my normal routine and went out on campus, I was met with the unthinkable reality of the 9/11 terror attack."

When the high school choir director took a leave of absence due to sickness, Tim filled in. He also took the choir to a couple of competitions that year, including a national competition held at Bob Jones University, Greenville, South Carolina.

In the summer of 2002, Tim began work on a master's degree in church music at Bob Jones University.

"It was amazing how God worked out the details for us to have a place to live in the old parsonage at the Easley Bible Methodist Church about 12 miles from the BJU campus!"

He made that trip for four consecutive summers and completed the program in 2005. This church music degree gave him a strong focus in hymnology, choral conducting, and vocal pedagogy. He was also required to perform a graduate piano recital.

#### **INCREASED RESPONSIBILITIES**

Garen Wolf had chaired the Music Division since 1976, directing both the College Choir and the Symphonic Wind and String Ensemble (SWSE), producing the annual Christmas Programs, and teaching classes. In 2008, he quietly began discussing retirement and a succession plan with Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Ken Farmer. Tim remembers a conversation Garen had with him around that time.

"We were on the SWSE tour and had just left a church in Thomasville, North Carolina, that morning and were heading to Virginia. For some reason I was sitting up front with Mr. Wolf, and he shared with me that he would be stepping down from his leadership roles in a couple of years. I was honored to have the inside scoop on what God was doing in Mr. Wolf's life. At that point, however, I had no idea that I would be the next choir director, but God was preparing me."





After the close of that school year, spring 2009, a select group of singers from the College Choir spent 10 days in Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland holding services in various churches. When Mrs. Martha Miller, the piano accompanist, was unable to participate, Tim, who had substituted for Martha from time to time, was asked to accompany the group.

"This was a trip of a lifetime, and I still have awesome memories of that beautiful land and the presence of God in our services. We had been forewarned that the people there could be a bit stoical compared to worshipers in the U.S. However, our students were warmly and readily received by our newfound Irish friends! On this trip I had opportunities to engage with the students on a new level. I sensed that God was preparing me for something different."

Tim's premonition was on target. During the next school year, he was asked to lead the College Choir upon Garen Wolf's retirement. Dr. Farmer and the administration selected three individuals to fill the three major jobs Garen had held: Dr. Jana Pop, chair of the Division of Music; Tim Crater, director of the College Choir; and David Hartkopf, director of SWSE. During the next academic year preceding Garen's retirement, each shadowed him and was given increasing leadership, assuming complete responsibilities in these areas in 2010.

In addition to directing the College Choir, Tim taught various music classes, advised/coached public relations music groups, and shared the responsibility of directing the Christmas Choir and Orchestra for the Christmas musicals with the SWSE director, David Hartkopf. He and choir accompanist Martha Miller chose the choir repertoire for gospel services, the Christmas program, and the classical oratorio concerts.

#### **25-YEAR REFLECTION**

That Tim has stayed and taught in Cincinnati all these years is as much of a surprise to him as anybody.

All through college his plan had been to return to Thomasville, North Carolina; but the Lord had other plans. Investing in young lives has been very rewarding, and Tim believes that GBS has some of the best young people in the world!

"Of course, I love my colleagues and enjoy working with talented, spiritually-minded people. Traveling with the College Choir has been a highlight of my career and ministry. Hearing our students sing under the anointing is a joy that will not be eclipsed until we get to heaven.

"All three of our children were blessed to be a part of the campus family along with many spiritual, musical, academic, and athletic opportunities. All three are very loyal to ACA and GBS and love Cincinnati to a fault. Best of all, each of our children has sought Jesus at the same chapel altar where I was dedicated to God by President E.G. Marsh in 1964. They have chosen to serve the Lord and have been mentored by godly friends on this campus. [See 'Family Tributes,' p.22.]

"The Crater family has grown during the last few years. Caroline married Ryan Craig in 2021, and Katrin married Christopher Dean Cravens in 2024. On December 3, 2023, God allowed Tanya and me to graduate to grandparent status with the birth of Emerson Ryan Craig! We are blessed to live on the same street with this boy and report that he has stolen Papaw and Nana's hearts!"

All of us here at God's Bible School offer congratulations to you, Tim Crater, for 25 years of excellent service! I know as you have reflected on these years, and as you move closer to retirement age, you say that you are open to what God has in store for you. We hope that means you will be staying right here at GBS where you belong!



For twenty-five years, you have been faithful in ministry, pursuing excellence in music that brings glory to God while instilling that passion within those you are training to take your place. Throughout those 25 years, you have also been a devoted husband, father, and, more recently, a grandfather to those who love you best. You have remained my dear friend from our first meeting on the Hilltop in 1983. May your enduring dedication bring you the joy of knowing you make a difference in so many of our lives as we celebrate you for your service at GBS.

adversity and painful losses was a testament to His grace in her life and an inspiration to those who knew her. Brittany's husband and children were her pride and joy. She gave birth to three children: Ellie (8), Granger (6), and Nehemiah (who died shortly after premature birth). She was also a passionate foster mother to two baby girls and fervently advocated for their welfare. With Kurtis' support, she homeschooled Ellie and Granger. Brittany found great joy in pursuing a sustainable and functional lifestyle, and she and Kurtis passed on that love to their children. Living in Alaska where she could raise goats, ducks, and chickens and spend time in her garden was a dream come true. She loved learning and became proficient in animal husbandry along with other skills necessary to their new life.

Brittany is survived by her husband, Kurtis; her children, Ellie and Granger; two foster children that were in their care at the time of her passing; and a host of loving family and friends. A memorial service was held at Creekside Church, Wasilla, AK. A private graveside service followed at a later date.

**DR. LEONARD LEWIS SANKEY**, 88, of Union, KY, passed away July 23, 2024, after a lengthy illness. He was born on April 7, 1936, in Greenville, PA, to William Paul Sankey and Leona Mae (Adams) Sankey. Leonard attended public schools and graduated from Penn High School in 1954. He enrolled at God's Bible School, Cincinnati, OH, graduating with a bachelor's degree in Bible and theology in 1960. While a student at GBS, he worked in the composing room of the Revivalist Press and as an orderly at The Christ Hospital. He traveled extensively in music ministry while a student and was a member of over 30 different quartet combinations.

Leonard was influenced by the school's steady emphasis on missions and was entirely sanctified during the midwinter revival of 1959. Leonard also became involved with the fledgling GBS National Alumni Association, singing specials as a soloist or in groups and leading congregational music. During this time, Leonard was asked to lead the singing for the InterChurch Holiness Convention. Thus began his long association with that organization.

It was at GBS that Leonard met and dated Janet May Ferguson (HS '59). On September 17, 1960, they were married, and the couple traveled for a year in singing and preaching ministry. In June 1961, they began pastoring the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Clarksburg, WV.

In June of 1962, they affiliated with Evangelistic Faith Missions (Bedford, IN) and sustained ministry with EFM until May 1979. During that time, they were missionaries in Guatemala and Honduras. They returned to Bedford in 1975 and continued serving EFM in deputation work and home office responsibilities, and Leonard served a term as interim director of the mission.

In September 1979, Leonard began pastoring Faith Mission Church in Bedford and continued in that capacity for 30 years. During that time, he served as founder and administrator of Stone City Christian Academy (1980-2009). In 1978, Leonard was elected president of the GBS National Alumni Association and held that position for two three-year terms, which also afforded him an ex-officio seat on the GBS Board of Trustees. He was then elected to the board on his own right. He retired as its longest

serving member—45 years, of which 25 (1991-2016) were as chair. During that time, Leonard was honored with a Doctor of Divinity degree from GBS during the school's 100th anniversary in 2000.

Leonard became involved in leadership of the InterChurch Holiness Convention. At the request of its general secretary, Harold Schmul, Leonard ably served as Schmul's assistant until elected to succeed him in 1998. He served the IHC with distinction for 19 years before stepping down in 2016. He remained passionately involved until the days preceding his death.

All through these years, Janet served faithfully by Leonard's side. When they returned to the States from the mission field, Janet at-

> tended nursing school from 1975 to 1978 and spent the next thirty years as a nurse, eventually earning a

master's degree. She retired as an adult nurse practitioner in 2007.

The Sankeys were blessed with three children: (Pamela) Beth (Stetler), (Anita Lavonne) Vonnie (Bryan), and (Leonard) Marc. These three also brought spouses into the Sankey family: Steve Stetler (who passed away in 2021); Edgar "Andrew" Bryan II; and Melodie (Miller) Sankey.


Surviving Leonard are his wife, Janet; his three children; eleven grandchildren; eight greatgrandchildren; and a sister, Betty Mae (Arden) McCartney. Many of his family attended and graduated from GBS. Four

have worked or are currently working for GBS: Marc Sankey (BRE '94), V.P. for Constituent Relations (2017-19); Maria (Stetler) Robledo (AA, BA '12), Director of Institutional Advancement (2012-17) and Director of Human Resources (2013-20); Kent Stetler (BA '15), Registrar (2017-present); and Beth (Sankey) Stetler (BA '85), V.P. for Finance (2022-present).

Funeral services were held July 27, 2024, in the J. Wesley Adcock Chapel, God's Bible School, Rev. Marc Sankey officiating; and July 28 at Faith Mission Church, Bedford, IN. Burial followed at Green Hill Cemetery, Bedford.

With great appreciation, God's Bible School and College takes note of what God has accomplished through this surrendered servant whose life has been poured out in ministry. He is now gone from us, but he will never be forgotten. His impact for God's Kingdom is immeasurable and will last throughout eternity.

I am so very proud of Tim. It has been exciting to see how God has led him through the years into His Kingdom service.





#### WHAT DOES JOHN MEAN BY "HAVE NO SIN"?

"In Sunday School today, we discussed 1 John 1:8, and I suggested that 'have sin' means 'having guilt,' based on similar language in John 9. However, I had trouble explaining the present tense of 'have sin.' Is it an acknowledgment of the state of past guilt before God, like a continual state of confession? Or is it just referring to acknowledging sin as it comes up in our lives? —Jorden

Dear Jorden,

You're right. The phrase "have no sin" means "have no guilt for sins committed." Let's look at the other three places besides John 9:41 where John uses the phrase "have no sin."

1. In John 15:22 Jesus says, "If I had not come and spoken to them, they would have no sin, but now they have no excuse for their sin." Jesus proposes a hypothetical. "If I had not come...they would not have sin." In context, this means that unbelieving Jews would not have been responsible for rejecting Iesus as Messiah if He had not come and told them who He was. But since Jesus did reveal the truth, "they have no excuse for their sin." They knew the truth. They were responsible for their sin against the truth. To put it theologically, a person is culpable—held responsible or blameworthy—for what they know (cf. Rom. 5:13).

2. In John 15:24, Jesus gives a second reason his persecutors have no excuse. He did works among

them that testified to His identity. Lazarus had been dead and buried for 4 days. Jesus raised him to life. How did people respond? They hated Him for it. And in hating Jesus, they hated His Father who sent Him. Jesus' works proclaimed for all to see, "This is the Christ, the Son of the living God." If Jesus had not done such miracles, they would not have been guilty for the sin of rejecting Him. But His works plainly showed who He was. They were without excuse. They were culpable—guilty—for their sin of unbelief.

3. In John 19:10 Pilate asks Jesus, "Do You not know that I have power to crucify You, and power to release You?" Jesus responds, "You could have no power at all against Me unless it had been given you from above. Therefore the one who delivered Me to you has the greater sin" (John 19:11). Most commentators identify the "one who delivered Me to you" as Caiaphas. Both Caiaphas and Pilate were guilty of sin. But Caiaphas, who knew more and should have led the way in accepting Jesus as

the Christ, had the greater guilt for his sin of unbelief.

In sum, every time John uses the phrase "have no sin" it means "to have no guilt for sins committed." That raises the question, "Who would say that we have no guilt for the sins we have committed?" The answer: the "deceivers" John warns about (1 John 2:26; 3:7; 2 John 1:7). The deceivers denied that Jesus was the Christ (1 John 2:22). The deceivers denied that fellowship with God requires walking in the light (1 John 1:6; 3:7). Only deceivers would say that they do not need Christ's redemptive work to cleanse them from sin. True believers have confessed their sins. True believers have admitted their guilt. And, as a result, true believers can testify that their sins have been forgiven. The formerly guilty are now right with God (cf. Rom. 5:1).

Regarding the present tense, it isn't either of the options you suggest—acknowledging our state of past guilt before God or acknowledging sin as it comes up in our lives. Rather, in 1 John 1:6–10, John contrasts the claims of unbelievers with the practice of believers. Unbelievers say, "We can walk in darkness and have fellowship with God" (1:6). Believers walk in the light (1:7). Unbelievers say, "We have no guilt for our sins" (1:8). Believers confess their guilt and sin and receive God's forgiveness (1:9). Unbelievers say, "We have never sinned" (1:10). Bottom line: believers can and should say we practice righteousness; we do not practice willful sin (1 John 3:6–9).

### MY PARENTS' LIFE OF MINISTRY

Ministry began for Dad as a young teen when he was given the opportunity to preach in his home church—Wesleyan Methodist, in Vero Beach, Florida. Born September 3, 1952, in Marion, Indiana, he was saved at age four and received his call to preach as a ninth-grader, becoming a district-licensed preacher at about age 16 or 17.

Prior to this, his intentions had been to become a medical doctor, and he had even written a paper about this "future career." But God had a

different plan for him. While Dad and his mother attended church, his father did not. In fact, his non-Christian father did not even allow a preacher to step foot into the Hooker home. When dad approached his father for his signature granting permission for him to attend GBS, a miracle happened. Grandpa signed the paper! The fall of 1970 found Dad making his way to a college he had only read about because his mother was a *God's Revivalist* subscriber. It is interesting to

note that, sometime later, when Grandpa was asked what his son Jack was doing with his life, he responded, "He is a preacher and a pretty good one, too." If you knew my grandpa, those words were golden.

The other half of this ministry team is my mom—Jane Theroff. She was the first of her family to leave home in southern Indiana. She had learned about GBS from academic dean L.D. Wilcox, who had been the evangelist at one of the camp meetings Mom attended. So, in 1973, Mom decided to leave for Bible college in the big city of Cincinnati! By the grace of God her life was forever changed! It was there that Dad and

Mom met, fell in love, and purposed in their hearts to follow God completely. They were married on June 22, 1974. This is the story of their ensuing 50 years of ministry.

Their first appointment was to Trinity Gospel Tabernacle in Washington, Ohio, in 1974. There dad served as assistant pastor of the church as well as principal of Trinity Holiness Academy. They lived on "next to nothing" and fought intense battles that later would prove to make them

stronger leaders. A year later they moved to St. Petersburg, Florida, to pastor the Bible Methodist Church in nearby Pinellas Park. It was an interesting church to pastor for many reasons, not the least of which was that the former pastor still attended the church; but God used her to aid their endeavors. It was at that stop that my

sister and I were born, and the Hooker ministry team grew from two to four. Dad did the preaching and Mom ran junior church, with me joining her for quality time in a baby swing! Mom and Dad actively threw themselves into bus ministries, each one driving a route. I have a vague, childhood memory of being strapped in the front of one of those vehicles—along for the ride! One of the things I appreciate about my parents is that ministry was a family affair. As daughters, my sister and I learned to serve, and this is what made us who we are today.

In 1984, our family moved to Stanton, Alabama, to pastor the Bible Methodist Church. Dad was also actively involved in Stanton Christian School as both a teacher and a member of the board. Mom began her teaching career there. It was also there that Dad found his love for the world of emergency medicine and fire fighting, which was a great community connection as well as a ministry tool. Mom developed her amazing teaching skills during this time and perfected the art of making southern sweet tea! Dad also took on the huge project of building a brand-new sanctuary. As a child I thought it was super cool to help carry 2x4s to assist him. One thing which characterized Dad's ministry was his knack for assessing cosmetic or building-related needs at each stop, and working to improve the physical structures.

The next ministry stop was in 1988 at the Bible Methodist Church at Fairmont, West Virginia, which was part of the Heartland Conference. The people of Fairmont were amazing! Every Monday, Dad volunteered for the Marion County Rescue Squad. His crew was affectionately called the "God Squad." I remember a specific prayer that God answered during our time in Fairmont that was a faith builder for our family.

My parents had a deep desire for their daughters to be in a holiness Christian school. When they received a call in 1990 to pastor Emmanuel Wesleyan Church in Gratz, Pennsylvania, they accepted. It was there that Dad was able to start a Christian day school with his associate pastor. He was also fully involved in bus ministry, hosted various ministerial interns, co-labored with associate pastors who are still dear friends (which speaks highly for his leadership style), and began the early stages of building a new church facility. He was also involved in the community through volunteering as an emergency medical technician for the local ambulance, over which he eventually became chief. Mom served faithfully beside him in children's ministry in both the church and the Christian school.

In 2001, Dad and Mom shifted to a time of service at their alma mater—God's Bible School. Dad served as Vice President for Advancement, and Mom faithfully supported him while teaching in the Cincinnati area. Dad, with the Lord's help, made a huge financial impact at GBS, which continues today through scholarships, and other long-term investments. He also worked in the area of alumni relations, which he continues to do on a volunteer basis. Dad couldn't give up his desire to be involved in the community, so he joined the Mt. Auburn Chamber of Commerce as well as the Mt. Auburn Community Council and stayed consistently involved while at GBS.

My parents then served at Franklin Bible Methodist Church from 2008 to 2017. What a joy it was to see the building of the Family Life Center there! When Grandma Hooker moved from Florida to Ohio, it was one of the biggest blessings in Dad's life. She had always been his biggest prayer warrior. The people of Franklin "loved on her" very well! Dad continued his involvement with the Heartland Conference, enjoying the youth camps and Bible Bowl quizzing. Mom continued working loyally to support Dad, praying faithfully for the people of the church.

After leaving Franklin, Dad became an interim pastor for two Bible Methodist churches in Ohio: Findlay (2017-18) and Danville (2019-21). Some people do not realize how critical this position can be for the continuance of a church. At each place they fell in love with the people, and the people fell in love with them. These were times of blessing and encouragement that God granted to my parents.

At present, my parents are serving at the Bible Methodist Church, Westfield, Indiana, where Dad is senior pastor. Our family has been amazed at what God continues to do in the lives of my parents who are completely sold out to Him. Dad loves his life as a preacher. He communicates effectively from the pulpit and connects personally with people. One parishioner recently commented, "Everyone wants to talk to Jack." Mom is content to stay in the shadows and faithfully support Dad, but her most powerful ministry is her prayer ministry. If she knows about your need, you are probably in her prayer book.

As their daughter, I can tell you that their 50 years of marriage and ministry is not something that is just a performance—it is years of devotion and dedication to God. I have had a first-row seat to see how God has blessed them and brought them forth as gold. However, this was only made possible by two things: God's faithfulness and that commitment they made long ago that they were going to serve God completely—no matter the cost. Now, 50 years later, their ministry continues.

Janna (Hooker) Cressman (BA '01) was a teacher in Aldersgate Christian Academy (2001-07), and a GBS college adjunct (2007, 2009-24). She currently is the GBS distance education (ADEP) Education Program Coordinator and an instructor in the Division of Professional Studies. After serving as missionaries in Honduras from 2017 to 2022 under Hope International Missions, Janna and her husband Wesley are now serving as HIM missionaries in Barcelona, Spain, with their two children, Ella (10) and Carter (5).

Editor's comments: Much more could be added to this story, including Jack's membership and leadership roles on numerous boards. However, let me comment on his GBS involvement. From his earlier ministry, Jack served as president of the Florida and Alabama chapters of the GBS Alumni Association. He later served two terms as national alumni president, which came with an ex officio seat on the GBS Board of Trustees. He continues to serve as a trustee and currently chairs the Alumni Affairs Committee. —KF

"Then Job answered the Lord and said: 'I know that you can do all things, and that no purpose of yours can be thwarted.... Therefore I have uttered what I did not understand.... I had heard of you by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees you; therefore I despise myself, and repent in dust and ashes." —Excerpts from Job 42:1-6 (ESV)

od is self-giving love at His very core. However, those of us who believe in a loving God may begin to form Him in our own image. We substitute our puny, weak view of love for His robust, well-rounded, infinite version. God is love, but He is not tame. I can't put Him in my little box and carry Him around. In His mercy and kindness, He is patient with my ignorance, allows my questions, and walks me through the difficult emotions accompanying grief and loss. But that doesn't mean He will let me stay there, wallowing in my wrong thinking.

Though God allowed Job to voice his frustration and anger, He eventually brought Job into an encounter with Him, and everything changed. Job's words remind me of times my whole perspective shifted after I came face to face with who God is. Job says, "I have uttered what I did not understand." In the light of God's presence, I am struck dumb by my lack of understanding and realize that some of my questions don't matter. This should in no way minimize the reality of grief and the necessity of walking through the process of loss and dealing honestly with its accompanying emotions. However, I must never forget that God is bigger, wiser, and better than I can imagine. He is worthy of my trust. I can rest in Him.
